## **Board Resolution on Fair Chase Hunting**

Whereas the social acceptance of hunting requires that the majority of citizens continue to see sport hunting as fair, ethical, safe and meaningful;

Whereas hunting will remain a privilege of citizenship, a part of our heritage and a benefit to wildlife conservation as long as the public accepts it;

Whereas the hunter engages in a one-to-one relationship with the quarry that should be guided by a steadfast set of ethics related to hunting, which includes the following principles:

- The hunter knows and obeys the pertinent laws and regulations, and insists others do as well.
- Hunters understand that hunting is not only about what is legal, but also what is honorable and ethical.
- Hunters define "unfair advantage" as when the game does not have a reasonable chance of escape.
- Hunters care about and respect all wildlife and the ecosystems that support them, which includes not wasting game animals.
- Hunter's measure success not in the quantity of game taken, but by the quality of the experience.
- Hunters understand and embrace the "no guarantees" nature of hunting.
- Hunters use technology in a way that does not give the hunter an unfair advantage over the animal and assures that technology does not diminish the importance of developing skills as a hunter or reduces hunting to just shooting animals.
- Hunters know their limitations and stretch the stalk not the shot.
- Hunters take pride in their decisions in the field and take full responsibility for their actions; and

Whereas hunting in today's world involves the regulated harvest of animals in a manner that conserves, protects, and perpetuates the hunted population; now, therefore, be it resolved that the Montana Wildlife Federation (MWF):

- 1. Will support legislation and policies that encourage ethical, fair chase hunting to protect our hunting heritage and to manage our wildlife.
- 2. Will oppose legislation and policies that do not abide by the principles of fair chase.
